Your Job:

Some Notes on Papers

There are a few rules about turning in papers that must be followed. If you are not able to attend class on a day that a paper is due, you must turn it in early. **Late papers will not be accepted.**

In addition, papers will only be accepted if they adhere to the proper formatting: Times New Roman font, size 12, 1.5 spacing. Citations should be given a page separate from your paper and not included in the number of pages called for—that is, you must turn in a 3-5 page paper *plus* a citations page. All citations must follow the Chicago Style of reference, which you should be able to Google with ease. Your papers will all be graded according to the same grading key, which I will hand out and discuss in the coming weeks.

I offer exactly one re-grade for anyone who asks. Just remember that a re-grade is just that – it could go up or down. Re-grades must be requested within one week of the day your exam is handed back to you, without exception.
