

Seminar in Experimental Economics

Seminar Description: The seminar in experimental economics provides graduate students with the opportunity to learn about current research from a number of different speakers. The seminar will feature speakers from outside the department as well as speakers from within the department. Graduate students engaged in research in experimental economics are especially encouraged to present their research in this seminar.

Requirements: Students may sign up to take the seminar course for a letter grade or S/N grading (course credit only). A student who signs up to take the course for course credit (S/N grade) is required to attend all meetings of the seminar. Additionally, the student must lead an advance discussion of one of the papers presented by a seminar speaker. (Details on these advance discussion meetings will be arranged in accordance with the seminar schedule). A student who signs up to take the course for a letter grade will also attend all meetings and must present his or her own research paper in the seminar. Student presenters should be working under the supervision of one or more faculty members.

Schedule and Discussion Meetings The seminar is scheduled to meet Fridays from 12-1:30pm in 4716 W.W. Posvar Hall. However, it is not always possible to adhere to this time and place for our meetings, so you should check the weekly seminar calendar available on-line at:

The discussion will be led by a student who is taking the seminar for course credit. If there are problems with meeting at this day/time, another can be arranged.

Your ACTIVE participation will make the seminar most useful to yourself as well as to the speakers who take the time to come here. To encourage participation, I will ask you to check your name off an attendance list circulated at each seminar meeting.
